



Avoiding Christmas 'Chocotox'

We all love nothing more than a bar of chocolate - The International Cocoa Organization estimates that the average British citizen eats over 11kg of chocolate a year! Although harmless to us (apart from to our waistline) chocolate can make dogs very poorly indeed! This is due to a toxin called

Theobromine, a chemical found in the plants used in chocolate manufacture. Humans are able to break down Theobromine quickly enough for it not to act as a poison. However, dogs metabolise the chemical much slower, meaning it can cause detrimental effects.

Different types of chocolate

The concentration of Theobromine varies between different types of chocolate. However, all forms of chocolate can be harmful to dogs depending on the amount eaten. Cocoa powders and beans contain the highest concentration of theobromine, and are therefore the most toxic form of chocolate a dog can ingest. Cooking chocolates can also contain very high levels of theobromine - therefore, chocolate cakes and cookies can also cause dogs to become unwell.

Symptoms of Theobromine poisoning

The poison itself takes between 4 and 24 hours to cause signs which include:

Muscle stiffness

Tremors

Vomiting

Heart arrhythmias and fitting.

The toxin stimulates the nervous system and makes muscles work much harder - this can have detrimental effects on both the heart and kidneys. Unfortunately, if left untreated, some cases of chocolate poisoning can be fatal. However, if you suspect your pet has eaten any chocolate at all, we would advise you seek veterinary advice immediately. It's sensible to keep any relevant wrappers, and try to work out the amount that you suspect or know your pet has eaten.

Not only is a case of chocolate poisoning extremely worrying for an owner, it can be very costly! Remember, lots of other ingredients found in chocolates can be poisonous too, such as raisins, peanuts or coffee beans. It's therefore vital that dogs are never ever given chocolate as a treat. Dogs enjoy sweet tastes, and so can develop a taste for chocolate, just like we can!



Saffy (no, we never changed her name), is doing just great. She is loved by everyone who visits, not a bad bone in her body and despite an unknown past she has gone from strength to strength. You did say on that very first day of

meeting her that she can be scared when trying to stroke her head we are way past overcoming that now. She was initially scared when we walked in with post in our hands, paper/magazines. Again, we can now walk in with the post

and she never gives either of us a second look. She loves the garden, mostly for the grass though she has on two occasions found the pond. It is all contained and she does come back in when called.

Training has been going well. Basic commands, putting a treat or toy down and getting her to ignore it until told she can eat/play. She still wants to play with every dog out there and although she does have good days where she will ignore (when told), I doubt we could ever let her run unleashed on the beach.

One of her favourite games is hide and seek and this seems to be a daily thing - early evening she will come running into the annex with a rope and invite me to chase her back through the house. She will sprint away while I hide behind a door, a wall, inside the downstairs shower and she will return investigating every area and when she has found me, off she sprints again. She always finishes with a drink from her bowl and a tickle. As I work early shifts, she will often go upstairs and sit on the end of my bed for an hour before I go to bed. Though she returns downstairs to her own bed when called. On my day off, if my wife gets up early, she will say to Saffy, "go see your dad" and Saffy will run up the stairs and jump on the bed with both feet and snuggle up.



We have had a few rescue dogs before Saffy but the changes we have seen in her in the relatively short time she has been with us are just amazing. She is so happy and has a new found confidence. Her tail wags so hard we think she is going to vertically take off. On a final note, she is no longer scared of trips out in the car which is a huge breakthrough. Now she will jump in to the car and I am sure recognises the word "beach".

LOOKING AFTER A 'SENIOR' DOG

Sadly, a dog's lifespan is relatively short compared to our own, and dogs are often referred to as "senior" after the tender age of seven! In very large breeds, such as Great Danes, it is even earlier. Many dogs will however still be perfectly sprightly until much later than this, even into their teens. The important thing is to recognise what you can do as an owner to keep your dog fit, happy and healthy for as long as possible. In addition to this it is useful to be able to spot the signs of age-related problems, both behavioural and disease related.



What you can do to keep your dog healthy right through into old age

Just like in humans, many factors are going to influence your dog's health throughout their life. A lot of these will be down to genetics, the breed, and the individual. You can do little to change this. There are however some important things that you can do to help your dog to feel good and from ageing prematurely.

Avoid obesity. Weight gain can happen at any age in a dog. It is often a sequel to neutering, as the neutered pet requires less food than before the op. It often happens gradually, and pet owners don't notice or just don't think it matters. The problem is that as time goes on, carrying excess weight puts additional stress on musculoskeletal and cardiorespiratory systems. This can make any clinical condition worse. For example, if your pet develops arthritis when they are older, being overweight will make this a lot worse. Keeping a dog at an ideal body weight during its life, can increase lifespan by 18 months and delay the onset of age-related conditions by 2 years. If you are worried your dog is overweight, do get help from your veterinary practice who will be happy to advise you.

Look after your dogs' teeth. Dental disease causes pain and difficulty eating. In addition, the presence of bacteria in the mouth can spread to other organs in the body causing disease and even death. Keeping dogs' teeth clean by brushing is highly recommended if your dog will let you. If you cannot do this, don't give up or use this as an excuse not to clean your dog's teeth. Talk to your vet or veterinary nursing team who can advise if your dog needs to have a scale and polish under an anaesthetic.

Give your dog the right level of exercise every day. Exercise is essential for maintaining both the musculoskeletal system and mental well-being. As your dog ages, they may not need the same length of walkies as they once did. However, being out and about and having a good sniff around is all part of a healthy lifestyle for dogs and should not be underestimated. Several short 10-15-minute walks may be all your older dog needs, but supplement that with interactive "playtime" at home. This doesn't need to be strenuous but can involve finding food from a treat ball or playing with some other motivational toy!

Maintain vaccinations and treat regularly for worms, fleas and ticks. There is a common myth that older pets do not need to be vaccinated regularly. This is not true. As your dog ages, its immune system becomes less able to fight infections, so it is very important to keep your senior dog protected.

Symptoms you should not ignore

Here is a short list of things that you should not ignore: Any new lumps and bumps however small. Lameness. Normal if your dog has arthritis, but any sudden worsening warrants a check-up. The development of incontinence - loss of control when urinating or defecation. Drinking and/or urinating more than usual. Sudden weight loss or gain - without trying! Sudden onset of extreme tiredness or lethargy. Obvious pain or discomfort. The development or worsening of a cough. Any breathing difficulty. Sudden deterioration in tolerating exercise. Decrease or loss of appetite. If you notice any of the above, or any other symptom which is out of the ordinary for your pet, don't hesitate to give your veterinary practice a call, or pop into make an appointment.

Make a tasty HOMEMADE TREAT for your dog this Christmas!

Do not let your pet over indulge or give your pet too many treats. Putting on weight over the festive season can happen to pets too! Pet treats should be factored in as part of your pet's daily food allowance, so other meals should be reduced accordingly.

Check with your vet first if you have any concerns about giving home-made treats to your pet. Treats may not be suitable for pets on specialised diets.

Liver cake

This recipe will make around 12 treats you can halve or quarter the recipe to make less treats.

> **Ingredients** 450 g of lamb or ox liver 450g self raising flour 3 eggs Milk or water

> > Method

Crack the eggs into a measuring jug Add an equal volume of milk/water to the measuring jug and whisk Blend the raw liver in a food processor Add the egg mixture and flour. Empty the contents into a greased baking tray. Bake at 180 degrees (160 fan) for approximately 30 minutes Allow to cool and cut into treat sized pieces.

Due to the meat content, these treats must be stored in the fridge, no longer than a week. Once cooled, you can also freeze these treats. Please remember that liver is a very rich food and should only be fed in very limited quantities.

This treat is a real winner and is used by trainers as a "highvalue" reward. This means it is so extra yummy that dogs will do almost anything for it! It is also recommended that liver cake treats should not be given to puppies under 6 months of age.
